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Cotton then went to England and studied car design. He returned to Brisbane in late 1909 and announced a vehicle he had planned for the Australian bush. Naming it Multum-in-Parvo (loosely, a great deal in a small package), Cotton said it was extremely versatile. The car could clamber over rough ground, cross deep creeks, climb any grade hill and pull cattle out of bogs. Using special attachments, it could also press and dump wool, work a pump for a shearing machine and lift a 1.8 tonne monkey for pile driving. It featured non-puncturing (solid) tyres and 35 cm of ground clearance.

Apparently, the versatility claims were verified when the Cotton was demonstrated at the Sydney Royal Show. A contemporary writer was most enthusiastic about the new car, saying he had seen various patented attachments used for 'hauling up heavy coils of wire or pumping water, or dumping wool and they were all equally successful'. After the show, Kingloe Ltd of Smith Street, Camperdown, Sydney, was appointed the sole Australian agent. The car itself was manufactured for Cotton in Britain with the motor-driven winch as standard equipment. No sooner was it ready for volume production than WW1 commenced and the project lapsed.
