1914 FRANCIS BIRTLES CENTENARY EXPEDITION 2014

Incorporating ADELAIDE to DARWIN VETERAN RALLY

Reminisces of Bob Lamond - infamous 1910 Brush driver and the Ghost of Francis Birtles- "Australia's Greatest Overlander"



FB They said this 1914 photo of me and my T was a photo of the Brush in 1912!

BL Yea mate and that Media Watch lacks any independence in my view, they expressed great interest - then did nothing and could/would not explain why?

BL Back to the Veteran Rally - the T or was it me was generating a bit of critical comment from some ladies for running too fast and reckless overtaking - yes we really flew for the first 16 days and yes a few of the back ups were not following Mark's 60 minute gap rule thus also backing up the public vehicles, at risk to all and particularly their entrant - so I overtook a bunch over double lines

- but with a clear view and a big speed plus. I had a few sporting friends to keep me company.

FB Wholly flapping ducks! - I enjoyed every minute - drivers should drive and not wobble along the road causing traffic backups - and how about those road trains - boy it was fun when you cut across the road when the last trailer just passed and our T was sucked along at least 8 to 10 kph faster with no strain on the motor - sadly camel trains did not have that effect for me in 1914 - merely an unbelievable smell!!

BL Ford really gave you a head start but you drove many other makes.

FB But riding with you in this Wunderbar T - as that German lady called it - reminds me of all my adventures with a T.

FB Any idea how many signs we saw on that 4,000+ expedition-millions - does the government think all drivers in 2014 are halfwits? or are they in general lacking basic common sense? In 1914 the only signs, if any, were mileage posts - and why all these fences - miles and miles of fencing around corners etc etc - it is insulting to a driver - does the government have to protect idiots from running off the road? going to sleep etc etc. Speed signs for speed around comers is OK to help drivers.

BL Sadly yes they are and yes they do - and many would not pass a thorough driving test.

FB Loved the old Daly Waters Pub - in 1914 there was only a grog shop -the smell of that Barra wunderbar! - it's no fun being a ghost - and Kakadu and Mary River - I have met a couple of ghosts of blokes eaten by crocodiles and

clearly they didn't enjoy it!

BL Around Daly Waters was when I had fuel starvation and could only get around 50kph so I drove like I did in my Brush - slowly - 3 days later we took off the carbie and my mates Wayne and Des Turnbull found the blockage behind the ball valve - "Back on the road again" *-flat* out up the airstrip at Coomalie!

Two iconic Aussie Squadrons flew from Coomalie to drive the Japanese from our re-

gion - 31 Sqd. Bristol Beaufighters on long range attack missions to Timor and 87 Sqd. flew Locheed Lightnings, Spitfires & De Havilland Mosquitos.

FB Holy flapping ducks - that Richard knows how to turn on a bush party! all this great aircraft just dropping in and having fun - I always wanted to fly - did some navigating in the search for Lasseter and in 1920 with Flight-Lt. Frank Briggs, in a de Havilland 4 bi-plane, I navigated the first aerial crossing of the Simpson Desert, Lake Eyre and the Macdonnell Ranges - and I navigated the first plane to land at Hawker in South Australia 1st October 1921 Pilot Francis Biggs, Mechanic George Bailey.



BL I learnt to fly in Natios in Tiger Moths and sure enough a lovely DR 82 floated in to land - mentioning floating that Port of Richards floated me right off!

Two treasures I admire, 1 I own the other I lust for.

The band, the old songs of WW2, the fireworks and the bonfire - what a fabulous way to celebrate the success of the 2014 Adelaide to Darwin Veteran Rally. I slept rough on the ground alongside my T around 3am and woke up to farewell the stars and welcome another bright sunny day. A Berocca, a Red Bull and a

few Panadols and a recovery breakfast on the strip - another run, in the T up the strip and back with a kangaroo crossing in front of the T and a plane landing over my head - what a great way to start our last day driving into Darwin.

The morning after?!

FB You didn't look to well young fella - posing for all those photos on the strip - a bit of redeye! Good thing I am a ghost so had no worries driving with you into Darwin - had another challenge from that nice bloke, David Couper in his lovely 1913 Overland - I think he got the best of you - you had a lot of fun earlier in the Rally overtaking each other - the T and David's Overland were by far the fastest cars



although we never had a run with Gavin Mutton's 1916 Studebaker - poor bloke was quite ill and only came good at the end.



Again I am honoured to think that you are single handedly doing this in memory of me, a simple bloke who loved the bush and took every opportunity to escape to the outback - Bob I think you truly share my feelings for our wide brown land.

BL That I do Francis - in spades - Mark ran a very different style of rally to the 2012 Across Australia very informal

- no starts and finishes no places at each over night stop where locals could view this historic once in a lifetime collection of Veteran bikes and cars all around 100 years young- no media, no promotion of the Start at The Museum or the The Finish at the Qantas Hanger, no VIP's and only one happy hour. As an entrant I thoroughly enjoyed the informality BUT I do think the Veteran Car Clubs must not hide from the public - to do so puts at extreme risk our continued fantastic registration and third party indeed our right to drive/ride our veterans - in this terribly correct proper? world of today it is important that the public sees us on the road, driving/riding our veterans safely over both long and short distances and supports our right to do so. BL It was good to get to Three Ways and head of to the east - and then the winds hit us - same as on our 1997 run to Melbourne in my Brush - I had to drive behind the trailer to make any speed - 2014 the MYT T battled along around 55 - until a few road trains came along and I snuck in behind them and enjoyed the free ride - sometimes for

over 2 kms if the road was straight.

FB You know it's funny how different it is to my 1914 run - I had mainly dirt tracks carved up by bullock trains my T would bounce from side to side and shake like a drowning rat - my new T soon became a very second hand T -dosen't look too new at the rabbit fence!

BL The T and I were worn out when we finally made it to Camooweal - then the power transformer at the roadhouse caught fire - blackout and no fire brigade to call - took 3 hours to get the line isolated and a mobile generator working to get the beer cold.

FB Gee wiz you really had it tough! Bulldust in 1914 I had the same winds, no road and it took me four days to make Camooweal and no motel just my tent and the hard ground.



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Remember this 1914 photo and look at my battered remains of the T.

No one to cook me a mixed grill- just me and a fire cooking a bit of roo.

BL OK I give in - our run to Cloncurry was much the same - strong winds and me eagerly looking in the mirror for signs of a road train to give us a tow.

FB Yes I have to give it to you - your as game as Ned Kelly - counting the wagons as the rush bye - then hard on the wheel and we're off -I had my heart in my mouth many times it was so close - and I am a ghost!

BL Then off to Winton -347 kms of cross winds, gusting to at least 50 kph, right hand down trying to keep the T on the road, tacking and reaching as if it was a yacht trying to keep the speed up - no road trains to help, dodging road kill all over the road - and the sight of the starving cattle - they looked like grey ghosts - a bit like you



FB - then in the last 50 clicks a road train, the wind dropped and we sailed into Winton around 75 kph - had to slow down for the 60 sign! The birth place of OANTAS.

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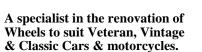
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
